STRENGTHS

- Good quality homes on large plots (with variety & examples of architectural merit)
- Rural feel in suburban setting
- Designated Conservation Area
- Good access to local amenities (shops, schools, park, railway, sport)
- Reputation as 'the place to live' in Sutton Coldfield
- Absence of businesses and apartments
- Efficient & long serving Estate Managers
- Residents who value the Estate and the accept the price of control and privacy



WEAKNESSES

- 120 year old infra-structure requires maintenance & renewal
- Poor state of footpaths & roads with constant damage from traffic, contractors, deliveries, park visitors & residents
- No consistent 'Estate' style on signage
- A conservative board (representing residents?) resistant to change who have not planned for long-term improvement
- Traffic & parking nuisance from commuters, 'rat runs' and park users
- Lack of modern board governance (age and term limits and rotation of board)
- Road frontage basis of funding may be outdated and unfair
- Poor communication with residents
- High cost of maintenance, leaf clearing and gritting
- Reactive rather than planned proactive attitude to maintenance
- Peripheral involvement in planning process has led to dilution of quality of Estate and problems with some older houses with large redundant gardens

OPPORTUNITIES

- Use of technology to improve communications, security and estate management
- Improvement in traffic management (speed limits, traffic calming, one way systems, gated access)
- Community schemes for power supply, Wi-Fi, cable, insurance, security
- Engagement with new Sutton Town Council and City Planning Department
- Improved security through restricting access, CCTV, number plate recognition
- Realisation of Estate assets
- Greater control of contractors via permits and deposits to minimise damage to verges, footpaths and roads



THREATS

- Financial constraints
- Disconnect between views of board and residents
- Increasing commuter traffic flows
- Increasing costs of road maintenance
- Birmingham City Council planning control
- Lack of respect for verges and footpaths by contractors, delivery vehicles and others
- Lack of vision by board and residents (NIMBY attitude)
- Congestion on local roads, particularly A5127 Lichfield Road
